

KA ORA TE WHENUA, KA ORA TE WAI, KA ORA TE TANGATA EDUCATION RESEARCH FOR SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES

Education and education research play an important part in understanding wellness. Wellness is affected by what is happening to the land, our water and to our communities. While these are not healthy, we cannot hope to live sustainably. As education researchers adapt to the Performance Based Research Fund's 'more capacious' definition of research, how do we as a research community ensure that our work contributes to more sustainable educational practices and relations, natural environments and social communities?



MORE ABOUT THE PRESENTATION STYLES

Individual paper presentation: All individual presentations will be allocated a 30-minute timeslot and grouped with two similar presentations where possible. When preparing your presentation allow for a 20-minute presentation and up to 10 minutes of questions and discussion.

Symposium presentation: A symposium presentation consists of three presentations and a discussant/chairperson, who may be one of the presenters. Each symposium is allocated 90 minutes. Organisers of symposia proposals must nominate a discussant/chairperson and organise the session to allow time for questions and discussion.

Roundtable discussion: A roundtable discussion consists of three or four papers that focus on a theme or issue for discussion. Papers of approximately 2,000 words from each author are available in advance and the expectation is that those attending the discussion will have read the papers and considered a question posed by the author. Each author will present a five-minute overview of their research and question before the facilitated discussion begins.

Submission guidelines: Abstracts will be reviewed on the following elements:

- 1. Objectives or purpose
- 2. Contemporary significance, scholarly relevance, and/or relevance to the conference themes
- 3. Perspective(s), theoretical framework, and/or methodology/methods
- 4. Results conclusions, implications and/or scope for future contributions.

Abstracts due 30 June 2023.

Student travel awards will be available again this year and information will be sent to caucus members in due course.

NZARE FELLOWS

The NZARE council are excited to present a proposal to establish a Fellowship programme. We outline the details of the proposal and invite you to provide feedback on it by the **15th May 2023** *to nzare.eo@gmail.com;* copy to *mere.berryman@waikato.ac.nz* and *robyn.caygill@education.govt.nz*.

CRITERIA FOR FELLOWSHIP

- 1. **Sustained and outstanding contributions to educational research**: Fellowship should require sustained and outstanding contributions to educational research (not just education policy, teaching, administration, and/or practice) over a significant timeframe.
- 2. Active engagement in service and contribution to education (including educational research, educational policy, and researcher development) beyond one's home institution: Fellows should also require sustained and outstanding contributions to the research environment, broadly conceived, and beyond one's normal contributions within an employing institution. Once elected, Fellows should be asked to include their FNZARE status in their bios, profiles, bylines etc when engaging in this type of service.

PURPOSES OF FELLOWSHIP

- To recognise a wider group of excellent researchers and their contributions to educational research, to the research environment, and/or to NZARE than can be recognised solely through the existing NZARE awards
- 2. To encourage a vibrant, cross-institutional Aotearoa-wide community comprising a diverse and representative group of educational researchers, including those reflecting all aspects of educational research, all research methods, and both Western and indigenous knowledge systems
- 3. To establish a college of fellows who are able to interact with each other and offer active support and service to education, educational research, the Association, and its members now and into the future
- 4. To allow the Association, through its Fellows, to have an increased collective role and voice in national and international conversations around education and educational research, allowing the Association to be publicly engaged as the 'critic and conscience of society'
- 5. To strengthen the place and mana of NZARE as the core educational research community for all educational researchers in Aotearoa NZ
- 6. To differentiate the roles of NZARE Council, NZARE Life Members, and NZARE Fellows so that across these three groups (along with NZARE's other existing awards), the aims of NZARE can be accomplished effectively and the health of NZARE can be maintained.

NZARE FELLOWS CONTINUED

PRINCIPLES OF FELLOWSHIP

While other professional organisations run highly competitive selection processes for their Fellows, we suggest that NZARE currently has a strong suite of awards and opportunities for recognising our most distinguished individuals and research teams. There are arguably key gaps, however, concerning NZARE's recognition for and active engagement of a wider bank of senior academics across a broad range of research areas. Many of NZ's Associate Professors, Professors, Heads of School, and Deans of education have had limited involvement with NZARE. In addition, not everyone who undertakes an honourable career conducting high-quality, ethical, and impactful educational research will necessarily generate the particular distinction associated with NZARE's existing awards.

We therefore propose that NZARE's Fellowship programme be underpinned by the following principles:

- Tiriti-based and inclusive: The selection of Fellows will recognise and value a wide range of
 knowledge systems, research methodologies, and ways of knowing, continually exploring what
 excellent contributions in any context might involve. The increasingly capacious definition of
 research used in the most recent PBRF consultation papers is reflected.
- **Criterion-based, not competitive**: Fellowship should be accessible to all those who have met appropriately high standards of (a) scholarship, (b) service to educational research, and (c) involvement in NZARE. The selection of Fellowship should not be a competitive process with limits on the number of Fellowships that can be awarded.
- Application/nomination-based: To avoid the risks of people being unduly advantaged or excluded
 due to existing connections, a transparent application/nomination process should be established
 whereby prospective Fellows can be nominated by either self or others and all applications will be
 considered equitably.
- **Distinctiveness**: The principles and processes associated with NZARE Fellowship should remain distinct from those associated with NZARE's other awards, including Life Membership.

ESTABLISHMENT AND SELECTION PROCESSES

The College of Fellows will be established when the first round of Fellowships are awarded. We propose that Council will appoint the Chair, who will then be responsible for appointing two further co-Chairs in accordance with Tiriti-based principles of inclusion and equity, whose job will be to lead the Fellowship process and award the first round of Fellows in time for Conference 2023

Fellows will submit applications by 1 August. After applications close, a subcommittee elected by the College of Fellows, and led by the Chair of the College of Fellows, will review the applications and advise Council the names of those they wish to appoint as Fellows. Council will ratify the recommendation and the new Fellows for each year will be announced at the AGM.
